## **Nevada Crime Victims' Rights:**

The 1983 Nevada Legislature mandated certain rights and guarantees to crime victims and witnesses. Accordingly, [Chapter 178](#) of the Nevada Revised Statutes recognizes the following needs and rights of crime victims.

You have the right:

1. To know the status of the case in which you are involved.
2. To be free from intimidation or dissuasion.
3. To know when your impounded property may be released.
4. To receive a witness fee for lawful obedience to a subpoena.
5. To understand the existing victim compensation laws and receive compensation if applicable.
6. To a secure waiting area, which is not available to the defendant or his family, when you are at court.
7. To know when the defendant is released from custody before or during trial (upon written request).
8. To know when the offender is released from prison (upon written request). \*

## **Federal Crime Victims' Rights:**

**Crime Victims' Rights Act.** Enacted in October 2004, the Crime Victims' Rights Act (part of the [Justice for All Act](#)) authorizes program efforts to:

- Help victims assert and encourage enforcement of victims' rights.
- Promote compliance with victims' rights laws.
- Fund grant programs and other activities to implement provisions.
- Provides an enforcement mechanism for rights delineated in the Act.

This Act also gives victims the following rights in federal criminal cases (18 U.S.C. section 3771):

1. The right to be reasonably protected from the accused.
2. The right to reasonable, accurate, and timely notice of any public court proceeding or any parole proceeding involving the crime, or of any release or escape of the accused.
3. The right not to be excluded from any such public court proceeding, unless the court, after receiving clear and convincing evidence, determines that testimony by the victim would be materially altered if the victim heard other testimony at that proceeding.
4. The right to be reasonably heard at any public proceeding in the district court involving release, plea, sentencing, or any parole proceeding.
5. The reasonable right to confer with the attorney for the Government in the case.
6. The right to full and timely restitution as provided in law.
7. The right to proceedings free from unreasonable delay.
8. The right to be treated with fairness and with respect for the victim's dignity and privacy.
